Our Mission

To provide a safe beach and aquatic environment throughout New South Wales.

Our Organisation

Today, Surf Life Saving NSW has members across 129 clubs and 11 branches who perform thousands of rescues, preventative actions and first aid treatments each year.

Our Inception

The origins of Surf Life Saving can be traced back to the actions of Mr William Gocher who, in September 1902 at Manly Beach, defied the law of the time by bathing during the prohibited daylight hours. As the popularity of surf bathing quickly grew into a national pastime, its dangers became apparent.

Small groups of experienced, regular surfers began to form themselves into lifesaving bodies to help people who needed rescuing from an unfamiliar environment.

As these clubs grew in size and number, the need for a united front to raise money and ask for help from local councils and the NSW State Government was identified and the NSW Surf Bathing Association was formed on 18 October 1907. The name of the Association was later changed to the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia, and in 1991 it was changed again to Surf Life Saving Australia.

Surf Life Saving NSW, formerly known as the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia (NSW State Centre) has operated within the state boundaries of NSW to fulfil the mission and goals of the Association since 1907.

I was also pleased to note that the organisation is continuing their successful Beach to Bush program, which is now in its 20th year. This program educates school-aged children in regional/ remote communities about safety at the beach and other aquatic environments. This is a significant and important program, as 50% of people rescued from the surf live more than 50km from the beach. Last year 9133 students were taught across 41 schools, in areas such as Armidale, Glen Innes and Tenterfield. My warmest congratulations are extended to everyone involved in the surf lifesaving movement for the role it plays not only saving lives on the beaches, but off the beach as well, through its first aid training and community education programs. Surf Life Saving NSW also contributes to the values of the Australian culture by giving people of all ages the opportunity to learn vital life and leadership skills, and by promoting the enormous benefits of volunteerism in the community.

Thank you for the wonderful service you provide to the community. My best wishes are with you all for the forthcoming season.

MINISTER'S FOREWORD

It gives me great pleasure to write the foreword to the 106th Annual Report of Surf Life Saving NSW. It has been another terrific year for the organisation, which continues to grow with membership now reaching almost 77,000 members.

As a fellow lifesaver I was honoured to speak at your Club Conference in August last year, which was a great occasion to meet fellow lifesavers from across the state and provide club members with the opportunity to share ideas and discuss solutions to existing challenges. I was also delighted to officially open the season at Dee Why SLSC, who were celebrating their centenary year and also to attend the Allphones NSW Age Surf Life Saving Championships in March on the Central Coast, which was a fabulous event for not just the members, but also spectators and the local community.

The NSW Government is committed to reduce the drowning toll in the NSW community and through the NSW Water Safety Black Spots Funding program, Surf Life Saving NSW commenced a statewide coastal risk assessment project last year, known as 'Project Blueprint', which assessed 10 Local Governments Areas, made up of 270 sites including beaches and rock platforms.

I was pleased to see that 'Project Blueprint' was awarded with the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials Australasia 2013 Public Safety Award, which is a significant accolade representing the importance of this project in reducing the drowning toll in New South Wales. With funding through the NSW Water Safety Black Spots Fund, Surf Life Saving NSW has also commenced a surf school project, which will deliver surf safety education to 3000 Year 9 students in Western Sydney.

In addition to surf safety education courses being delivered to schools and in the community, Surf Life Saving has also joined forces with the North Coast Destination Network to provide international visitors with beach safety information so they have the knowledge to stay safe at the beach.

With additional funding to enhance lifesaving capabilities, Surf Life Saving NSW's Emergency Response System has continued to play a vital role in supporting the State's emergency services network by responding to 543 callouts at unpatrolled locations and times. This represented a significant growth on the previous year of 45%. This system has been particularly responsive in rapidly deploying lifesavers, lifeguards and support services in high-risk circumstances, including dangerous rip currents, rock platforms and upturned boats.

On behalf of the NSW Government, the community and visitors to New South Wales, I would like to thank you for your commitment to water safety and for your continuing enthusiasm for lifesaving.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



"We are working towards our goal of saving lives, creating great Australians and building better communities"

It is my great pleasure to report on another successful year for Surf Life Saving in NSW.

The 2012-13 year brought us many challenges and some major achievements. We are a bigger organisation than ever before, with a membership of 77,000. Our 22,000 active patrolling members contributed in excess of 679,000 patrol hours, performed 3996 rescues and more than 126,000 preventative actions. This is an outstanding effort and I congratulate all members and each of our 129 clubs in addition to our support operations groups for their selfless contribution to keeping the beach-going public safe.

It's very clear now that the contribution of our volunteers is extending well beyond the flags. Our state-wide Emergency Response System responded to 543 calls for assistance this season and our thanks goes to the volunteer State Duty Officers and the callout teams in the branches and clubs for the enormous contribution you have made to saving lives anywhere. The SLSNSW Emergency Response System continues to save lives across the state, demonstrated by the 1593 emergencies responded to since 2008, with a 45% increase in requests for assistance in the past 12 months alone.

Our surf sports season was also extremely busy with the Stramit NSW Country Championships wrapping up a fourth year at the very popular South West Rocks venue. Next year, the event will relocate to Mollymook SLSC on the South Coast. Our pinnacle state event, the Allphones NSW Surf Life Saving Championships were held at Ocean Beach-Umina in March and attracted more than 7000 competitors to the Central Coast region. To the Ocean Beach and Umina SLSCs, thank you for hosting the NSW Championships, along with Gosford City Council for supporting our premier sports event. While we are reflecting on the achievements of the past year in this annual report, we also have our sights firmly set on the future too. Our plans and operations must reflect the dynamism of the membership we represent and so we have spent considerable time developing a comprehensive strategic plan, which will be put in place for the next season and will provide direction for our organisation through until 2016-17. This strategic plan will be based on the strategic intents in the Surf Life Saving Australia 2020 Vision and will help us work towards our goal of saving lives, creating great Australians and building better communities.

To my fellow Directors and Advisers, thank you for your support and hard work in steering SLSNSW forward in 2012-13. The Board would like to extend a special thanks to outgoing directors Dennis O'Sullivan (Director of Finance) and Gary Chapman (Director of Member Services) for their considerable efforts in advancing our organisation over recent years. We welcome new directors of Finance and Member Services, Pip Butt and Glenn Langley, and wish them well in these portfolios.

To our hard-working staff, thank you for your enthusiasm and efforts in ensuring the goals and strategic vision set by the Board and the State Council continue to be met.

Finally a sincere thanks to all our volunteers and their families for their continued vigilance and commitment to keeping our beaches safe.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

Welcome to the 106th Annual Report of Surf Life Saving New South Wales.

The past year has seen a significant expansion in many areas of our organisation – in lifesaving services, community engagement and education initiatives, along with further growth in membership and great participation levels at surf sports events.

While we can proudly say that no lives were lost between the flags, unfortunately despite our best efforts, coastal drownings in NSW totalled 48 for 2012-13. Tragically this is the highest number of fatalities in more than 15 years.

This demonstrates that more than ever, our services are in demand, both on and off the beach. We are attempting to tackle the issue of drowning prevention head-on with ambitious and wide-ranging strategies and research projects, along with collaboration with other water safety groups, government agencies and local communities.

With support from the NSW Ministry for Police and Emergency Service's Water Safety Black Spot Fund, the first year of Project Blueprint, our coastal risk assessment project, has now been completed. More than 370 kilometres of coastline has been assessed, including 270 individual sites. In the process more than 19,500 spatial data elements along the NSW coast have been collected. The result is an enormous body of work which will provide land managers with valuable information they can use to make informed decisions on water safety issues. In the first year of this project, 10 Local Government Areas were assessed: Tweed, Byron, Ballina, Coffs Harbour, Wyong (including Munmorah State Conservation Area), Gosford, Waverley, Randwick, Sutherland and Wollongong.

Another very important project we successfully delivered with funding support from the NSW Government was the \$2M

Capital Facility Development Program. We were pleased to see much needed improvements delivered to surf club facilities and infrastructure with 16 clubs receiving funding in 2012-13. This generous support helps our surf clubs to continue to save lives, protect their members and better serve their communities. Since the program's inception in 2005-06, more than 85 clubs in NSW have received funding for capital works or other improvements.

We are grateful for this valuable assistance from the NSW Government's Office of Communities, Department of Sport and Recreation. Given the success of this program, on behalf of our clubs we are strongly advocating for the continuation of this important grant program into the future.

Our sponsors, partners and supporters are vital to our ongoing viability as a community organisation and we thank the NSW Government, Federal Government, DHL, Westpac, Telstra, Allphones and Stramit Building Products for backing the efforts of our members in so many ways.

Along with our two portfolio Ministers, the Hon Michael Gallacher MLC and the Hon Graham Annesley MP, I would also like to thank the Parliamentary Friends of Surf Life Saving NSW, chaired by Mr Darren Webber MP. This group has given our organisation a huge amount of support over the last year and been very active in recognising our achievements and promoting the significant value of the services we provide to the community.

I thank our Board of Directors, branches, clubs, all members of Surf Life Saving NSW and the staff for their continued dedication, enthusiasm and passion.

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





State Council

The State Council of Surf Life Saving NSW (SLSNSW) consists of 11 Branch Presidents.

Duties

- Elect the Directors
- Inform the Board of significant issues affecting the membership
- Assist the Board design and review SLSNSW's strategic direction
- Discuss State-wide issues
- Approve any amendments to the Constitution
- Provide feedback to the Board on the results of its governance decisions in practice at the member level.

Meets formally twice per year:

The AGM is to be held within the period of six months after the end of the financial year, but is usually held in November.

The Election State Council Meeting is held preferably in May.

Board of Directors

President, Deputy President, Director of Finance, Director of Lifesaving, Director of Education, Director of Surf Sports and Director of Member Services.

Duties

- Oversee SLSNSW's strategic direction and priorities
- Interact with key stakeholders to inform them of achievements and ensuring that they have input into determining strategic goals and direction
- Regularly scanning the external operating environment to ensure that SLSNSW's strategic direction remains both appropriate and achievable
- Monitor organisational performance and evaluate strategic results
- Ensure financial viability and security of SLSNSW by setting financial governance policies
- Report back to the stakeholders at the AGM
- In accordance with the SLSNSW Strategic Plan, establish the policy framework for governing SLSNSW, from which all operational policies and actions are developed
- Evaluate its effectiveness as a Board of Directors
- Appoint committees, panels, advisers to carry out aspects of their work

Meets as often as is deemed necessary in every calendar year.

Rotating 2 year terms for Directors

- President, Director of Finance, Director of Education and Director of Surf Sports shall be elected in each year of even number
- Deputy President, Director of Lifesaving and Director of Members Services shall be elected in each year of odd number

Advisers

As soon as practical after the Election State Council Meeting, the Board may appoint:

- A Lifesaving Adviser
- An Education Adviser
- A Surf Sports Adviser
- A Member Services Adviser
- Or any other Adviser that the SLSNSW Board may consider necessary from time to time and whom need not be members

Role of Advisers

The SLSNSW advisory positions oversee and advise in specialty areas of surf lifesaving, such as surf sports, coaching, education, medical and health.

Duties

- May be required to attend State Council Meetings (without the right to vote)
- May be invited to attend Board Meetings for specific discussions

- Life Membership and Honours Committee
- The Rules and Constitution Committee
- Meritorious Awards Committee
- Surf Sports Selection Committee
- Finance and Audit Compliance Committee


Appointed or elected each year or for longer terms by the Board. Other committees may be formed if required and will be appointed by the Board according to the Constitution.

Our skilled, professional staff provide administrative and operational support to all areas of Surf Life Saving in NSW. They are driven by the shared mission "to provide a safe beach and aquatic environment throughout NSW."

SLSNSW and SLS Services combined currently have 65 staff members and many are also actively involved in a volunteering capacity as members of surf clubs throughout NSW. Our workforce is diversely spread across age groups and we comprise an almost equal male to female gender headcount. The Human Resources team adheres to relevant employment policies and ensures that the most appropriate person is hired into every role.

Over the last 12 months, Human Resources has achieved continual improvement in the areas of retention, learning and development, workplace health and safety and workplace relations.

Staff retention

Similar to other not-for-profit organisations, it is often difficult to attract and retain suitably skilled staff, mainly due to limited financial resources. For this reason, we continually develop and communicate our positive workplace culture to potential candidates and existing employees which increases our ability to attract and retain staff.

Our statistics show that 60% of our staff have worked at SLSNSW for more than two years, with the average employment period being three years, six months. This is reflected in our low turnover rate which has reduced for the second year running – down from 19% last year to 17% during this period.

SLSNSW continually explores better ways to support our staff through development and performance planning.

Workplace Gender Equality at SLSNSW

This year SLSNSW submitted an annual compliance report to the Workplace Gender Equality Agency for the period April 2012 – May 2013. Some of the areas highlighted in the report include:

- 56% of our staff in Officer positions are female.
- 60% of our Management team are female.
- Our headcount by gender shows that 54% of our staff are male, 46% female.

SLSNSW recognises the advantages of having a gender equal workforce and this is reflected in our gender composition, remuneration and workplace practices which support staff with family and caring responsibilities where possible.

Learning and Development

Our staff are encouraged to improve their skills in order to achieve individual, team and organisational goals. We have continued our relationship with AIM (Australian Institute of Management) and sourced government funding where possible. A number of staff have undertaken on the job traineeships with 100% completion rate. This State Government initiative has meant staff have improved their skills and received valuable Business qualifications.

Over the last 12 months our staff have attended a variety of internal and external training depending on the individual's needs. Our internal workshops have covered important training in sexual harassment, harassment and bullying, how to deliver effective presentations and IT skills and software programs. Gap analysis systems are in place assisting HR to identify training requirements and more recently we have implemented formal feedback processes ensuring our staff receive effective training in the future.

Work Health and Safety (WHS)

SLSNSW takes workplace health and safety very seriously and this is evident in the day to day practices of our staff and in the support provided to our volunteers. Compliancy with the Work Health and Safety Act is vital for management at club, branch and state levels.

As part of our WHS training program, SLSNSW will be distributing a revised NSW version of the Guidelines for Safer Surf Clubs ensuring best practice is maintained in NSW clubs. A CD will accompany the guidelines ensuring easy access to important forms. Branches and clubs can anticipate receiving these important resources prior to the start of the 2013-14 season.

The WHS e-Learning platform has also been updated to reflect the new work health and safety legislation. A survey aimed at assessing the need for further WHS training will be distributed to our volunteers in late 2013.

Minimal workplace injuries over the last 12 months reflect the ongoing culture of safety within the Australian Lifeguard Service and SLSNSW staff. Workplace Safety audits are completed regularly at SLSNSW headquarters and work health and safety is an agenda item in staff and management meetings.

Workplace Relations

There have been significant changes in various workplace relations laws during the last 12 months requiring HR to implement changes to workplace practices to ensure compliance. Areas which have been reviewed include Workers Compensation, Paid Parental Leave, Traineeship incentives, Equal Opportunity for Women, Working with Children and Anti-Discrimination.

A review of the Staff Policy Handbook has been completed ensuring legislative compliance and currency. Other initiatives assisting with employee engagement have been developed including an employee opinion survey which is currently underway and further research into a suitable Human Resource Information System.

2012-13 Season

22,000 active surf lifesavers **3996** rescues **126,402** preventative actions 679,611 volunteer hours

Overview

The 2012-13 season was extremely busy and saw many records broken for lifesaving activity state-wide. During the season our 22,000 active surf lifesavers undertook 3996 rescues, conducted 126,402 preventative actions and contributed 679,611 volunteer hours to the community.

The commitment these volunteers exhibit on a daily basis are a testament to all those who have gone before and represent a contribution to society that is beyond measure.

Sadly, the coastal drowning toll in NSW shows no sign of improvement with 48 drowning deaths in 2012-13. This is despite Surf Life Saving providing more patrols, callout services, public education initiatives and proactive warnings than ever before.

Coastal Risk Assessment Project

With the commencement of 'Project Blueprint', where every beach, headland and rock platform in NSW is being risk assessed, SLSNSW is positioning itself to more accurately than ever identify sustainable initiatives to bring the drowning toll down. With funding through the NSW Government's Water Safety Black Spot Fund, this body of work will facilitate more effective and cost efficient solutions to address drowning issues locally, regionally and across the state. This SLSNSW led project is innovative and unprecedented in its scale and collaborative focus; appropriately it is generating a significant amount of optimism and excitement within the water safety industry.

Communications

The 2012-13 year saw a significant body of work undertaken through our Coastal Radio Network Review. The Review Panel set itself a clear goal to enhance radio communications and support to the frontline membership and the public. The recommendations have now been incorporated into a strategic action plan for lifesaving communications in NSW that will consolidate Surf Life Saving operations within the emergency service space, save more lives and better support our people.

A major outcome of the review has been the centralisation of SurfCom facilities and the bolstering of SurfCom capacity over the next three years. In line with the increasing levels of rescue activity, stakeholder expectations and enhanced technical and training support now required within a SurfCom, the Review Panel determined centralisation was in the best interests of the organisation's objectives - to better support its members and save more lives along the coast.

The new 2013-14 season will see state-wide SurfCom support delivered from three communications centres (Avoca, Belrose and Warringah), providing 7-day a week service over the full patrol season with a final delivery model of a single State Operations Centre/SurfCom operation by 2014-15.

SurfCom personnel from the Far North Coast (SurfCom Ballina), Central Coast (SurfCom Avoca), Sydney (SurfCom Sydney) and South Coast (SurfCom Kiama) must be commended for the dedication and support they have provided locally and regionally over many years. Their contribution has been fundamental in progressing lifesaving communications to the point it is at now. Their legacy will help shape the future of Surf Life Saving in NSW and nationally.

We also extend our thanks to the volunteer members of the Review Panel, who contributed a significant amount of time (over and above other volunteer roles) to the project.

Lifesaving Operations and Equipment

Three year lifesaving services agreements have been reviewed over the past six months and are now set until 2016. This will continue to provide consistency and clear expectations to clubs, members and the public. Thanks to the Branch Directors of Lifesaving for their hard work in this key area of lifesaving standards.

SLSNSW has also continued to support branches and clubs with core lifesaving equipment. Through a federal Emergency Volunteer Support Scheme grant, SLSNSW was able to provide water rescue manikins and trauma simulation kits to all branches - aimed at strengthening club, service and emergency callout training and exercises.

This comes in addition to more than \$400,000 worth of frontline lifesaving equipment granted to clubs in the past year through State Government programs and other stakeholder support.

The SLSNSW emergency response system continues to save lives across the state. The ongoing commitment of our State Duty Officers, Branch Duty Officers and club service callout teams ensures our 24/7 capacity continues to strengthen – showcased by the 1593 emergencies responded to through the system since 2008, with a 45% increase in requests for assistance in the past 12 months alone.

Always looking at opportunities for enhancement, SLSNSW and the branches have worked hard over the last 12 months to rollout 'night-operations' capability to the majority of regions. This targets those emergencies that occur around dusk and extends the Surf Life Saving response into the time-critical period when someone first gets into difficulty.

Thanks must be extended to our partners at NSW Police Marine Area Command, Police Radio (communications) and Polair. Their ongoing professional support and partnership is making a major difference to our ability to quickly respond to emergencies and save more lives along the coastline. Working together, we are now able to ensure the closest, most appropriate lifesaving services are notified and can respond to emergencies more effectively.

The next 12 months will see a heavy focus on delivering the goals set by the Coastal Radio Network Review, including the upgrade of many existing repeaters and the installation of additional ones. A focus on supporting branches to deliver more consistent and effective patrol audits is also a priority, and assisting branches and clubs with equipment R&D and grants will continue.

Again we thank the members for their continued selflessness and dedication and we look forward to the 2013-14 season being the best ever.

The ALS NSW continued to perform strongly across the 2012-13 season in providing a best practice, highly skilled contract lifeguard service under the banner of Surf Life Saving NSW (SLSNSW), supporting Surf Life Saving as the peak coastal safety authority.

As the first choice contract lifeguard service, the ALS upholds and supports the core principles and values of surf life saving in a commercially competitive environment, contributing to and supporting the lifesaving activities of SLSNSW.

The ALS prides itself on recruiting from within the volunteer base of the broader organisation, providing employment opportunities to the membership. More than 80% of employed ALS lifeguards (over 330 Lifeguards employed during the summer peak period) contribute in a volunteer lifesaving capacity as well.

The ALS remains the confirmed leading provider of contract lifeguard services to Local Government Authorities (LGAs), with significant long term contract renewals by Tweed Shire Council and Pittwater Council secured this year. Working closely with Byron Shire Council, the ALS is now providing a patrol service on Main Beach for seven months of the year, a great result for the local community and visitors to Byron Bay.

The provision of ALS lifeguards for Event Water Safety was significant over 2012-13. ALS lifeguards contributed to the success of events such as the World Rowing Championships, Dragon Boats, Rowing, Tough Mudder and Opera.

With recent interest from other LGAs, the ALS will need to ensure that the operation continues to provide a value-adding and cost effective integrated service which enhances community safety.

The ALS greatly appreciates the support of all surf clubs which provide building access and shared gear and equipment – this partnership delivers better beach safety and community service outcomes on behalf of councils.

The ALS thanks councils and other contract partners, not only for the ongoing support of the ALS and Surf Life Saving, but for the strong commitment in recognising the importance of providing a high-quality lifeguard service to their local communities.

Australian CoastSafe is undertaking an ambitious project after funding approval was granted under the NSW Water Safety Black Spot Fund to conduct 'Project Blueprint', a Coastal Public Safety Risk Assessment for every beach and rock platform in NSW. This project will be fundamental in addressing the coastal drowning issue in NSW both in the short, mid and long term.

An average of 92 people drown in Australian coastal waters every year. New South Wales (NSW) accounts for almost 50% of the national coastal drowning toll. There have been 292 coastal drowning deaths in NSW between July 2004 and July 2013. Over 53% of these drownings can be attributed to swimming/wading (29.8%) and rock-fishing (23.4%), with almost all occurring at unpatrolled locations or outside of patrol operational times (Surf Life Saving Incident Reporting Database).

To address this issue Surf Life Saving NSW, through the assistance of the NSW Ministry for Police and Emergency Services Water Safety Black Spot Fund, has delivered a coastal public safety risk assessment service for 10 NSW Local Government Areas with the highest drowning rates over the past seven years.

The audit team comprises of three Coastal Public Safety Risk Assessors who have now completed year one of the project. The team is consistently engaged in the field for weeks on end, working hard to consult with stakeholders having local, regional and state authority and correlate the vast amount of data and information pertaining to coastal risk and drowning issues.

This data is then made available to local and state land managers and provides the vital supporting evidence required for the effective and efficient implementation of drowning prevention strategies. Data is presented in a manner consistent with ISO 31000:2009 Risk Management – Principles and Guidelines, providing land managers with a prioritised treatment plan consisting of options for implementation.

The project has increased the focus on community safety which in turn reduces the likelihood of risks and hazards going unnoticed and incidents occurring. Outcomes, in addition to lives saved, include reduced duplication, reduced costs, improved jointoperations and partnerships between stakeholders and longterm sustainable and effective drowning prevention strategies.

Coastal Risk Manager, Adam Weir believes "the right solutions, implemented at the right locations, at the right times, targeting

the right people and implemented as part of a long-term strategy by the relevant stakeholders is the key to this project".

This project is the first time the coastal public safety risk assessment process has been delivered over entire stretches of coastline.

Over four years the project will cover 1590 km of coastline, which includes 600km (38%) of rocky coastline and 990km of sandy coastline (62%).

A total of 892 beaches will be assessed as part of the project. The first year of the project has now been completed, with over 370 kilometres of coastline being assessed made up of 270 individual sites, including 270 beaches and rocky coast locations and in the process collected over 19,500 spatial data elements along the coast of NSW. All collected data is geocoded and can be analysed using Geographic Information Systems (GIS) and incorporated into mapping systems.

This data will also be used to enhance both Surf Life Saving and Emergency Service response and planning, and will also be incorporated into the Australian Beach Safety and Management Programme.

In order to facilitate this project, Surf Life Saving has developed a suite of low cost, hi-tech, location based tools. These tools are used for a range of applications including public education, data collection, event risk management and coastal public safety risk assessment. The coastal public safety risk assessment application, also known as iRisk, was the first app of its kind to be developed. As such it forms part of Surf Life Saving's world leading approach to risk management and coastal public safety risk assessment services.

These tools can be made available through a global distribution network to anyone with an iPhone or iPad. International organisations such as the Royal National Lifeboat Institution, Surf Life Saving Great Britain and Lifesaving Society Korea are already discussing how these applications may be adapted for their environments.

AUSTRALIAN LIFESAVING ACADEMY

The Australian Lifesaving Academy NSW has now been in operation for nine years. 2012-13 was the biggest year yet for the Academy across both First Aid Training and First Aid Services. Significant milestones were reached for the business, including surpassing 200,000 people in total, trained since the Academy's inception. At 30 June 2013, the total people trained was 211,271.

First Aid Training

The Australian Lifesaving Academy NSW working under the Surf Life Saving NSW Registered Training Organisation (RTO) has now been servicing the NSW and ACT community for more than nine years.

"Transforming everyday Australians into lifesavers" remains the core mission of the Australian Lifesaving Academy NSW. The Academy strives to meet this mission through the delivery of effective first aid training, the provision of frontline first aid services and water safety at events, and through surf and water safety programs throughout the state.

During the past year the Australian Lifesaving Academy NSW has continued to grow its first aid training services. During the period 2012-13 we issued 43,790 awards which was an increase of 19.36% from 2011-2012. At this rate we expect to exceed 250,000 awards issued before the end of 2013.

Of the 43,790 total awards delivered during 2012-13, 12,286 were First Aid awards and 15,952 were CPR awards. The remaining 16,552 awards comprised of Emergency Care, Advanced Resuscitation, Spinal Management, Junior First Aid, Junior CPR (Basic Resus), Remote First Aid, and accredited Asthma and Anaphylaxis. A significant development within our training operations over the past 12 months included entering into strategic partnerships with Surfing NSW, AFL NSW/ACT, and the Australian Defence Force Academy (ADFA).

The Australian Lifesaving Academy teamed up with Surfing NSW to assist in the roll-out of a unique Surfers Rescue 24/7 (SR24/7) program which recognises the significant and mostly unheralded role that surfers often play in coastal rescue efforts. The course will provide an opportunity for all surfers in NSW to do a free CPR and customised board rescue course. The free course, which has been delivered to more than 1000 recreational surfers, school groups and board rider's clubs throughout NSW since November, will provide the education and necessary skills surfers can draw on if found in a difficult situation and ultimately will result in lives saved across the state. Surf Life Saving NSW is proud to be partnering with Surfing NSW to deliver the CPR component of the course.

In the 2013 AFL season the AFL NSW/ACT released its updated 'Sports Trainers in Community Australian Football Policy'. A key component of the updated policy is for the AFL community volunteers to complete an Emergency Response Co-ordinator (ERC) course. The partnership between AFL NSW/ACT and the Academy provides an easy, enjoyable and cost effective pathway to compliance with this policy and courses have been rolled out to more than 250 AFL volunteers at 15 AFL NSW/ACT community clubs across the state and ACT.

In January we were notified of a successful result in a training tender with the Australian Defence Force Academy (ADFA). The term of the agreement is for three years and involves the provision of Apply First Aid training to Midshipmen and Officer Cadets at the ADFA campus in Canberra. The initial two courses were successfully held in February and May 2013, involving more than 600 ADFA personnel.

As always we cannot operate without our dedicated team of Academy Trainers, sales team and administration staff throughout the state. We thank you for your continued professionalism and hard work and efforts towards saving lives.

First Aid Services

The Australian First Aid Services (AFAS) division of the Academy was contracted to support many events during the past 12 months, but none more significant that the 2013 Australian Youth Olympic Festival (AYOF) held in Sydney during January 2013. Contracted by the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC) to provide emergency first aid to athletes, spectators, staff, and associated contractors during the event, in total the AFAS provided 1176 first aid hours across 18 sports/disciplines and this was only made possible by the efforts of the 45 experienced AFAS first responders who were on duty during the event.

In total for the year the AFAS provided 3126 hours of first aid services, up from 1328 hours in 2011-12.

Ongoing events for the Premiers' Department, Hillsong Church, Football NSW, Junior Rugby Union Club, NSW Schools Athletics and Dragon Boats NSW also kept the first responder team busy.

The Academy continues to grow from strength to strength in its personnel, established services as well as diversification into new service provision streams. The significant achievements outlined in this report are a testament to the hard working team of both full time staff as well as our army of casual trainers and first responders.

We are committed to continuous improvement while the ultimate goal is to develop practices in education that simplify our processes, assisting us to achieve and maintain quality training and assessment which ultimately supports our vision of zero preventable deaths and injuries on NSW beaches.

All 11 branches have worked towards achieving this goal, however with an even more efficient approach we can provide a quality training environment with consistency. This will be our focus for the coming season.

As always, we would like to thank the Branch Directors of Education, Academy staff and everyone involved in education within their club and branch for their on-going support and commitment to Surf Life Saving and their local communities.

Member Training

State Branch Directors of Education Meeting

This annual event is an opportunity for SLSNSW to workshop ideas with the Branch Directors of Education in planning for the following season. It assists the organisation in improving training methods and provides an opportunity for SLSNSW to communicate any upcoming changes which may affect branches and clubs.

As in previous years, we had the branches nominate their five main issues which were then discussed and workshopped. The ideas that were discussed among the groups will be reviewed and those which are feasible will be actioned over the next 12 months.

Registered Training Organisation

This year the Academy took a different approach to auditing with the Balance Score Card process being implemented. This was to simplify the task without diluting the content. Branches and clubs were supportive of the change and we aim to capture 100% of branches/clubs in the coming years.

The SLSNSW Academy has undergone a complete review of all policies and procedures and related forms to ensure that these continue to align with our current practices and best practice in education.

There is some uncertainty in the current vocational educational environment with many changes forecast to be introduced in 2014. SLSNSW continues to lobby where appropriate on behalf of members and the wider volunteer network, however change appears to be inevitable. As always we will endeavour to ensure that the impact on members is reduced as much as possible.

Resource Development

Our members have been trialling courses through Pulse (online learning management system) to assist with automating processes and supporting an environmentally sustainable approach to education. The online facility was available for the SLSNSW Cert IV Training and Assessment and Facilitator Upgrade courses and next season will be made available for many more of our awards.

All courses delivered by SLSNSW from the Health Training Package were updated to comply with National Standards through a fantastic effort from our commercial trainers.

Courses trialled this season included:

- Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue a new course trialled nationally
- Silver Medallion Basic Beach Management resources have been comprehensively updated
- Silver Medallion Advanced First Aid a new award incorporating Spinal Management, ARTC, Pain Management and an additional module
- Certificate IV Public Safety (Search & Rescue Management) this was trialled in Sydney Branch only

SLSNSW has also been involved in providing subject matter experts and feedback for courses including:

- 34th edition Public Safety Training Manual (to be released 2014-15 season)
- Specialist Powercraft Manual released during the 2012-13 season
- Radio Operator Certificate now available

- Pool Lifeguard (Bridging Course) trial continuing
- Various online courses available 2013-14 season

SLSNSW funded this worthwhile water safety presentation and concentrated on visiting areas with a high student population which were not too remote, to ensure that costs were kept to a minimum.


The presenters visited 9133 students across 41 schools in a slightly condensed program.

SURF SPORTS

Surf Sports in NSW continues to thrive on the back of yet another exciting season full of wild weather, challenging conditions and some great sporting results and achievements.

Some of our major Championship events were affected by some extreme weather while others were hosted in near perfect conditions. From gale force winds, king tides and east coast lows to consistent sunshine and great surf – our competitors, officials, volunteers and spectators all battled the elements with great dedication and enthusiasm. Both competition and development continued to improve in 2012-13 and NSW is again leading the way in terms of progression. There are exciting times ahead for Surf Sports with ongoing funding from the National body and the Australian Sports Commission as well as reviews into both coaching and officiating. Branches and clubs are also making some major progress in Surf Sports with events and development programs being implemented and delivered across the state.



SURF SPORTS

Coaching

An increase in overall number of coaches in the state suggests that the short term future of the sport is in a good position. The introduction of the Junior Coaching Course and proposed changes to the accreditation process and curriculum will help to further increase and improve the knowledge of our new and upcoming coaches.

Kevin Neilson and Peter Kirkwood were once again instrumental in the delivery of six Level One Coaching Courses and a Level Two Coaching Course across the state. Their ongoing dedication and passion for teaching resulted in the accreditation of 106 new Level One Coaches and 10 Level 2 Coaches – taking the overall number of accredited coaches in NSW to 1275 – more than 45% of coaches Australia wide.

Surf Life Saving NSW continued to offer numerous opportunities for new and developing coaches to learn from some of the most recognised and respected coaches in the sport through our Coaching the Coast and Regional Development Clinics as well as the Country Athlete Exchange Program. Looking to the future, we have further opportunities for some of our 'up-andcoming' coaches with Development Coach Positions available on representative team tours.

Officials

Our officials continue to rank as some of the most experienced in Australia. NSW now supplies almost 50% of all accredited officials across the country. Similar to the coaching statistics, the introduction of the Junior Officials Course has added another exciting step to the Officials Pathway and contributed to the growth of total accreditation numbers in the state.

We are facing a long term challenge when it comes to new officials. The average age of our officials sits at 50 years old. While they are still as willing and able as ever, there will come a time in the near future when these fantastic people that we have come to recognise as all too familiar faces on the beach may themselves consider retirement from officiating duties. Clubs, branches and SLSNSW have to encourage the younger members of our association to take on officiating roles at surf sports events because as we know, without the volunteer officials – our sport wouldn't exist.

Many of our coaches, officials and volunteers received recognition across a number of different award ceremonies throughout the 2012-13 season (from page 59).

Events

We enjoyed a full season of Surf Sports events with a total of eight Championships delivered throughout the state. The success of some of these events, in particular the State Championships, means SLSNSW is constantly under pressure to deliver these huge events to the highest quality for our members and volunteers.

One of the greatest challenges facing the sport is the continued scrutiny and evolution of safety enhancements when delivering Surf Sports events. SLSNSW has greatly improved the level of risk reporting and response at these major championship events and it is important that this evolution continues right down to a club level.

While there are still many processes that are yet to be perfected, we are confident that our events are continuously improving across all aspects from timetabling, people management, and entry/results systems through to moving forward with greater use of technology and social media.

It is fair to say that the Age Championships at Ocean Beach-Umina presented some significant challenges with extreme weather conditions disrupting the normal flow of the event. This event highlighted a few key areas that require greater detail in the event of similar situations occurring at future SLSNSW events.

SLSNSW will continue to work closely with host clubs and branches alongside the local councils in season 2013-14 and beyond to deliver our State Championship events to the highest quality possible.

Overview

The Surf Life Saving brand is an Australian icon and is widely recognised and well respected by the community. The main goal of the Media and Communications strategy is to enhance the Surf Life Saving brand and communicate important information to the public as well as our own members.

To meet these strategic aims, we conduct an extensive media relations program, which focuses on being both proactive and reactive to events and incidents which occur throughout the year.

Surf Life Saving NSW communicates to members in a variety of ways, including a weekly e-newsletter to all clubs, social media channels including Facebook, Twitter and Instagram, a website which hosts a variety of resources for members and the public, regular updates from individual portfolios and directly disseminating important information to clubs and branches.

Throughout the season we had many opportunities to attract positive media attention for the efforts and achievements of our members, including our monthly Rescue of the Month award, Australian Medals and Bravery Awards and elite athletes selected for teams and squads.

Media Activities

The NSW Surf Life Saving Championships were held at Ocean Beach-Umina in March and were extremely well supported by local media organisations in the Central Coast region. We partnered with Southern Cross Austereo through its Central Coast radio stations SEA FM and 2GO. Again, NBN TV provided us with significant support, airing Community Service Announcements in the lead up to the Championships, as well as covering the event in its nightly news and sports broadcasts.

Our volunteer season launch "Raising of the Flags" is a colourful event which attracts much attention from media. This season we had Raising of the Flags ceremonies at numerous locations throughout the state, including Sydney's Dee Why Beach. These events give clubs, branches and SLSNSW the opportunity to showcase the diversity of the surf lifesaving movement, recruit new members and promote key safety messages.

Now in its fifth year, our state-wide Emergency Response System which coordinates callouts anytime, anywhere, has grown significantly and our media team is kept busy updating the public, through the media, on these serious incidents and successful rescues.

Online Initiatives

The Media and Communications team has continued to explore and expand into the world of social media utilising online networking tools to deliver information and better engage with our members, particularly young volunteers. This strategy has been a major success. Since its launch in September 2011, SLSNSW social media presence has been growing steadily with more than 7000 Facebook followers.

Our Social Media platforms proved invaluable during the 2013 Allphones NSW Surf Life Saving Championships, when severe weather disrupted the event program significantly. The SLSNSW Facebook and Twitter feeds were used to relay the latest timetable information, images, news and results.

During the season we also launched a Surf Life Saving State Operations Centre Twitter account (@slsnsw_soc), which provides real time updates on operational activities and emergency callouts. The SOC twitter feed has also become a simple and easy way for media organisations to keep up to date with progress on rescues or major incidents.

The SLSNSW website also received a complete overhaul, with the support of a grant from the Federal Government's Emergency Volunteer Support Scheme. The website was redesigned and updated to more effectively deliver relevant information to members and clubs.

PwC Transparency Awards

This year we were recognised for the quality and transparency of the information we make accessible to our members and the public. For the third year in a row, SLSNSW was named a Top 10 Finalist in the PricewaterhouseCoopers Transparency Awards (\$5m to \$30m revenue category.)

FUNDRAISING AND PARTNERSHIPS

Fundraising

Surf Life Saving NSW undertakes a range of fundraising activities each year with the goal to raise as much money as possible to distribute to our 129 NSW clubs and 11 branches. Each compliant club and branch will receive \$6311 from the following fundraising programs in 2012-13:

Programs

Raffle

Last year the raffle program performed favourably with a 4% increase on the prior year's results. This clearly shows that the raffle program is building on the gains it made in 2011-12 and we will continue to closely monitor the results and look for ways to maximise the returns. There have been several initiatives implemented around the raffle program to ensure its success moving forward. These initiatives include: increased training for raffle sellers, increased events identified for raffle tickets to be sold at and increased detail and thought given to the marketing of each raffle.

We continue to regularly provide raffle seller locations to all clubs and branches prior to any activity taking place and where necessary communicate any special activities to ensure everyone is aware of what is taking place and where.

Telesales

The telesales program that is contracted to a third party specialist continues to support the work done by the SLSNSW raffle program in NSW.

Guardians of Surf

The Guardians of the Surf program is managed by the Surf Life Saving Foundation (SLSF) who we have worked with over several years to grow and develop this program. The Guardians of the Surf have again contributed significantly to the annual fundraising distribution allowing clubs to continue to upgrade, replace and repair the vital lifesaving equipment required to allow us to continue to provide our service on the beach. We sincerely thank all those regular givers who are the Guardians of the Surf and everyone else who makes a donation to the organisation.

Fundraising Events

As well as our raffle and regular giving programs, Surf Life Saving NSW also drives fundraising events to not only raise funds for SLSNSW lifesaving initiatives and programs, but also to raise awareness of Surf Life Saving and highlight our lifesaving and community safety initiatives.

Sydney International Boat Show, 28 July - 1 August 2012

The 2012 Sydney International Boat Show was held at the Sydney Convention Centre, Darling Harbour from Thursday 28 July until Monday 1 August 2012. Surf Life Saving NSW was offered a 3m x 3m stand in the 'Marine Precinct' for the course of the event. SLSNSW provided a Surf Rescue Jet ski, Surf Life Saving educational collateral, SLSNSW raffle sellers and staff and volunteers for the stand over the five days of the Boat Show. The event was a success for the organisation with significant funds raised from a combination of donations, merchandise and raffle ticket sales. Our on-going involvement at this event in the future has been highlighted as an opportunity to increase



our fundraising and water safety awareness activities and to introduce new membership opportunities and promote our skills in First Aid and CPR training.

Sydney Telstra 500, 2-4 December 2012

For the third consecutive year Surf Life Saving NSW was chosen as the charity recipient for the Sydney Telstra 500 V8 Supercar event at Homebush. Surf Life Saving NSW provided tubes of SLS branded sunscreen to the attendees of the V8's for a small fee as well as collection tins for donations from the public. There was also SLSNSW education collateral present for the public to take away in the form of posters, magnets and pamphlets. Over the course of the event Surf Life Saving NSW had the SLSNSW Education trailer onsite along with a team of fantastic volunteers to help with collections and educating the public on surf safety.

Boardies Day, Martin Place, Thursday 21 February 2013

The Surf Life Saving Foundation once again drove a national fundraising day for 2013 in the form of Boardies Day. Boardies Day is an easy way for everyone in the community to raise funds for Surf Life Saving - all you have to do is swap your corporate wear or school uniform for your favourite pair of board shorts and make a donation in support of Surf Life Saving. In 2013 many schools and corporate organisations in NSW got on board to raise funds for Surf Life Saving NSW or their local surf club. Surf Life Saving NSW staff and volunteers held a highly successful 'Boardies & Budgies' sale at Martin Place in the Sydney CBD and were overwhelmed by the response to these. The fantastic interest generated by this appeal led to great fundraising results over the course of the day's activities.

GoFundraise online fundraising site

Surf Life Saving NSW has continued its agreement with online fundraising platform 'GoFundraise' to expand its fundraising ability. This agreement allows Surf Life Saving NSW to create and manage its own online fundraising events or leverage off major events in the NSW community. It also allows supporters of Surf Life Saving to create their own fundraising pages to fundraise on behalf of Surf Life Saving NSW. An example of this initiative is the current 'Blackmore's Running Festival' partnership where supporters of SLSNSW can design their own pages and direct their fundraising towards SLSNSW when participating in this event.

Pin & Win' Campaign

This year for the first time Surf Life Saving NSW has come onboard with the national Surf Life Saving Foundation (SLSF) 'Pin & Win' Campaign. These scratch cards also come with a signature Surf Life Saving pin attached for supporters of SLS who buy the pins to wear proudly. All money raised within NSW through this program is distributed back into NSW at the conclusion of the campaign from the national fundraising pool.

To celebrate the start of the season Surf Life Saving NSW will be coordinating two fundraising days at selected sites in Sydney. Manly Corso and Martin Place have been locked in as sites that will expose the SLSNSW brand to the maximum amount of public interest. With activities that include the sale of board shorts, 'Pin & Win' scratchies and the distribution of educational collateral, these fundraising days will provide important avenues for raising funds and public awareness for SLSNSW.

NSW Office of Communities, Sport and Recreation

Capital Facility Development Program

The Department of Sport and Recreation's continued support of Surf Life Saving NSW through this program has delivered immeasurable improvements to many club facilities across the NSW coastline. Through this year's \$2 million Surf Club Facility Development Program, 16 Surf Life Saving Clubs were successful in receiving much needed funding for facility upgrades and rebuilds.

NSW Ministry for Police and Emergency Services

Co-operative funding and Enhanced Rescue Capabilities Program

Through the Ministry for Police and Emergency Services, Surf Life Saving NSW receives ongoing funding for our operations through our Co-operative Agreement and for the second consecutive year, we received an additional \$1 million in funding through the Enhanced Rescue Capabilities Program in recognition of the development of the Emergency Response System.

Water Safety Black Spots Fund

Through the NSW Government's Water Safety Black Spots Fund, Surf Life Saving NSW received a grant of \$332,000 to commence the first year of 'Project Blueprint', a Coastal Public Safety Risk Assessment for every beach and rock platform in New South Wales. This will provide a 'Blueprint' for NSW from which an effective drowning prevention strategy can be developed.

In its first year the state-wide 'Project Blueprint' targeted priority black spots in 10 Local Government Areas, which included: Tweed, Byron, Ballina, Wyong, Randwick, Wollongong, Waverley, Coffs Harbour, Sutherland, Gosford and Lake Munmorah. Surf Life Saving NSW was also successful in securing \$320,000 to carry out year two of this project.

The Water Safety Black Spots Fund also supported Surf Life Saving NSW with a grant of \$66,570 to deliver surf safety education to students in schools at key residential black spot locations in Western Sydney. Through Surf Life Saving NSW's 'Surf School' project, we are aiming to modify the behaviour of young people before they reach the critical age of 18.

Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter (Southern Region)

The NSW Government committed \$1.5 million this year to assist in funding the operation of the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter (Southern Region) in Sydney and the Far South Coast for the 2012-13 year. This funding ensured that the search and rescue service was able to provide a 24/7 service in the Greater Sydney Region and a second service on the NSW South Coast, operating during daylight hours, year round.

Emergency Volunteer Support Scheme

Surf Life Saving NSW was successful in securing funding through the joint State and Commonwealth Natural Disaster Resilience Program as part of the Emergency Volunteer Support Scheme (EVSS). This funding supported Surf Life Saving NSW with two significant projects, directly assisting the membership. Firstly \$42,505 was granted to purchase water-rescue manikins and advanced casualty simulation kits for use by branches in training lifesavers in the new Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue course. Secondly, \$45,000 was awarded to Surf Life Saving NSW to design and rollout an online induction course for new members, which will be in place for the 2013-14 season.

NSW Government Community Building Partnership Program

Surf Life Saving NSW would like to thank the Premier of New South Wales and all the State Members of Parliament who distributed funding in their areas to 11 Surf Life Saving Clubs through the 2012-2013 Community Building Partnership Program for infrastructure projects. This funding enabled those Surf Life Saving Clubs to undertake repairs and upgrades to their clubhouses. It also enabled a number of those clubs to build secure facilities for storing rescue equipment.

NSW Communities Relations Commission

Community Grants Program

Supported by the NSW Government through the Community Relations Commission for a Multicultural NSW, Surf Life Saving NSW was awarded with a grant to deliver surf education tailored specifically for Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) communities and refugees in the Wollongong area. This involved conducting surf safety family days in the Wollongong area specifically for refugee families.

Department of Primary Industries

Observation Towers Funding Program

Through the NSW Department of Primary Industries, Surf Life Saving NSW received funding to provide water resistant binoculars to every club in New South Wales under the Observation Towers Funding Program.

Australian Government

Surf Life Saving NSW received funding from the Federal Government's Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet and the Australian Sports Commission, which was administered through Surf Life Saving Australia for black spot funding and surf sport participation based programs.

- The NSW Safer Coastal Waters Sub-Committee, Marine Stakeholder Consultative Group, State Marine Rescue Consultative Committee and Rock Fishing Safety Development Group (Ministry for Police and Emergency Services).

National Search and Rescue Award

Surf Life Saving NSW and its volunteers were recognised by the Australian National Search & Rescue Council with a Certificate of Recognition for outstanding dedication to the community, in particular through the Emergency Response System.

Advocacy on Behalf of Surf Life Saving Clubs

Security of Surf Life Saving Clubs on Crown Lands

Surf Life Saving NSW has been liaising with the Crown Lands Division throughout the 2012-13 year to advocate for greater security of tenure for Surf Life Saving Clubs on Crown Lands. Surf Life Saving NSW has advocated strongly to the NSW Government that no Surf Life Saving Club should be worse off under any new policy and there needs to be greater clarification of the maintenance, condition and ownership of facilities across the state.

Surf Life Saving NSW is continuing to work closely with the Crown Lands Division to progress a standardised lease template for Surf Life Saving Clubs and seek greater security of tenure through a consistent minimum lease term.

National Not-for-Profit Reforms

In 2012 with the establishment of a national regulator, the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profit Commission (ACNC) there have been a number of Bills and reviews relating to the regulatory framework and taxation of the Not-for-Profit sector.

Surf Life Saving NSW advocated to the Australian Government through the review of the ACNC exposure draft legislation and the Charitable Fundraising Regulation Reforms for financial reporting to be made easier for our Surf Life Saving Clubs who are often under resourced and don't have the paid staff or financial expertise to follow complex and costly reporting and compliancy requirements.

Surf Life Saving NSW did however welcome proposed changes, which would see the alignment of State and Federal reporting requirements that would result in reducing the duplication of reporting requirements for all our affiliated entities.

Updating our Members on Changes to Government Legislation and Regulations

Surf Life Saving NSW has provided information and fact sheets to our Branches and Clubs to update them on changes to Government legislation and regulations, in relation to:

- The phase in of the new Working With Children Checks.
- Changes to reporting requirements, obligations and duties to charities following the introduction of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profit Commission (ACNC).
- Amendments to the State Emergency and Rescue Management Act relating to Inshore Water Rescue protocols.
- The implementation of the new Work, Health & Safety Legislation, whereby Surf Life Saving NSW circulated fact sheets and DVDs to clubs about what implications these changes had on clubs. Incident notification fact sheets and posters were also circulated.
- Best practice guidelines for charitable organisations on the NSW Government's Charitable Fundraising Act.
- Workers Compensation fact sheets.

In addition, Surf Life Saving NSW provided pre-season briefings relating to State Government Tsunami and Flood Plans, and information from key emergency service stakeholders.

Partnerships

Beach Safety Tourism Partnership with the North Coast Destination Network

Surf Life Saving NSW launched a new partnership with the North Coast Destination Network to provide surf safety material to visitor centres, airports and tourism providers, in English and seven other languages including: traditional Chinese, simplified Chinese, Korean, Japanese, Hindi, Malay and Arabic. It is also supported by links to the BeachSafe website: www.beachsafe.org.au

The new tourism partnership also attracted attention in the NSW Parliament this year when the Minister for Police and Emergency Services, Michael Gallacher MLC provided a comprehensive outline of what Surf Life Saving NSW does to educate and ensure the safety of all visitors to NSW beaches.

Partnership with Surfing NSW to deliver Surfers Rescue 24/7 course

Through the NSW Government's Water Safety Black Spot Fund, Surf Life Saving NSW has partnered with Surfing NSW to deliver the CPR component of the Surfers Rescue 24/7 course. This is a free course being offered to recreational surfers, school groups and board riders clubs throughout NSW, to provide them with the education and skills surfers can draw on if found in a difficult situation. The first component teaches surf rescue techniques using a surfboard and the second comprises a nationally accredited CPR qualification by Surf Life Saving NSW. This program has already seen over 45 rescues conducted across the state, most in remote beach communities.

National Compact Partner

Surf Life Saving NSW is a National Compact Partner, which is an agreement between the Not-for-Profit (NFP) sector and Australian Government to improve the way we work together based on greater trust, respect and collaboration. The shared vision is for the NFP sector and the Australian Government to work together to improve social, cultural, civic, economic and environmental outcomes, building on the strengths of individuals and communities.

Surf Life Saving NSW Wins 2013 Public Safety Award for Project Blueprint

Surf Life Saving NSW was awarded with the Association of Public-Safety Communications Officials Australasia (APCO) 2013 Public Safety Award for our state-wide coastal risk assessment program, Project Blueprint.

The APCO Australasia Awards showcase the best of the public safety sector, celebrates the leaders in emergency management and rewards hardworking members and professionals who have gone above and beyond in pursuit of service, innovation and communications excellence. Surf Life Saving NSW is honoured to have been recognised by APCO, which represents all sectors of public safety and emergency management through communications and technology innovation throughout Australia.


The 2012-13 season has seen the Member Services team deliver new initiatives, engage with fantastic young members and recognise the many dedicated volunteers from around the state at a wide range of internal and external events.

The projects and activities that have been undertaken showcase the work that the outstanding members of Surf Life Saving NSW achieved throughout the whole year.

Membership

Membership numbers in NSW have increased by 1.5% this season, with the state now having 76,922 members. Our patrolling membership has remained static with 21,523 members donning the red and yellow this year. Our junior activities (nippers) members reached 31,290 members which is a 1% decrease on last season's total.

The first ever state-wide Surf Club Open Day was held on Sunday 26 August 2012, supporting the SLSNSW Strategic Plan to grow membership for sustainability. The Open Day aimed to give clubs the opportunity to open their doors to the public and promote Surf Life Saving within their community. Seventy-seven clubs within NSW registered for the event; hosting a range of activities including lifesaving demonstrations, clubhouse tours, barbecues and displays. Taking on club feedback, the 2013-14 Surf Club Open Day will be held on 29 September, and have more tangible resources to support club recruitment strategies.

MEMBER SERVICES

Member Development

A range of member development activities were run throughout the 2012-13 season, contributing to the SLSNSW Strategic Plan to provide pathways and opportunities for members of all ages to develop skills and qualifications. This season has seen SLSNSW financially support branch youth development programs, conduct the Junior Lifesaver of the Year (13-14 years), the Youth Opportunity Makers Workshop (15-17 years) as well as the 18-25 years Development Networking Program.

Members of Surf Life Saving NSW also participated in a number of internal and external opportunities including Surf Life Saving Australia's National Leadership College, the National Leaders Masterclass as well as the Young Leaders in Emergency Services Forum. As a state we were oversubscribed to all programs showcasing the depth and demand for leadership and development opportunities.

Organisational Development

The Member Services team has worked on a number of initiatives to support branches, clubs and members throughout the year including a club constitution template, a liquor license fact sheet and a number of fact sheets and 'how to' guides following the club conference. All resources created and shared support the SLSNSW Action Plan to facilitate organisational development programs and pathways for clubs and branches.

The 2012-13 season has shown some outstanding results as part of the Quality Clubs Program, with the very first Silver Level Status being awarded to Woonona SLSC. This is an outstanding result which recognises the focus that Woonona has on continual improvement and best practice operations. With a gap of five years since the last Club Conference, the Surf Life Saving NSW Board of Directors determined it was time to bring everyone from around the state together. With assistance in funding provided under the Emergency Volunteer Support Scheme, the 2012 Club Conference was held.

The two main themes of the Conference were 'Respecting Our Past, Building Our Future' and the notion of 'Creating Great Australians'. The conference sessions were focussed on understanding the role of surf clubs in the 21st century, how to connect with different generations and where Surf Life Saving is headed in the future.

More than 230 Branch and Club Presidents, Club Captains, Administrators, Secretaries and Treasurers attended the conference. Each were given the opportunity to network and discuss best practice management and the latest developments in surf lifesaving, as well as develop solutions to some big challenges and share their successes with others.

The conference included sessions from Ronni Khan from Oz Harvest who inspired attendees with her amazing journey of how one person can make a difference and Avril Henry who spoke about how different generations communicate, and how to encourage them to work together. Other sessions were conducted on Social Media, WorkCover, Recruiting and Annual Reports.

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FAR NORTH COAST

Congratulations to Far North Coast lifesavers. One hundred and forty six people are alive today because of your efforts. In addition to these 146 rescues, Far North Coast lifesavers carried out more than 9000 preventative actions, performed 735 first aids and responded to 89 emergency callouts. This is a job very well done by our 1300 members and Ballina Jet Boat crew.

Bringing great credit and recognition to the Far North Coast Branch this season was Ballina Lighthouse and Lismore SLSC, the first club in the region to be awarded Surf Life Saving Club of the Year at Branch, State (2012) and National level. The Club also achieved Bronze Status in the Quality Clubs Program, achieved recognition as SLSNSW Rescue of the Month and club member Rod Balkin was presented with Volunteer of the Year at the Ballina Shire Council Australia Day Awards ceremony. These are simply magnificent achievements for a club operating out of shipping containers whilst it awaited a new clubhouse. To cap off a memorable season and by way of due recognition, the SLSA Board convened one of its regular meetings in Ballina.

The Branch has developed a widely known and admirable reputation for its ongoing work in Youth Development. Again in the past season two camps were conducted, firstly for the 13-14 age group at Bilambil and then for the 15-17 age group at Fingal. Both camps were strongly supported and proved highly successful. Director Paul Smith, his wife Carol and their many supporters are to be commended on developing and ensuring the future of Surf Life Saving in this region.

The competition arm of the branch was again most prominent. Most clubs were represented and performed above expectations at all levels including Interbranch, Country, State and Interstate titles. Byron Bay convincingly won the Stramit NSW Country Championships. The Surf Life Saving Pool Rescue Championships held at Southern Cross University were again a resounding success. The direction and conduct of competition on the Far North Coast continues in the safe hands of long serving Director, John Watson.

The Ballina Jet Boat is one of the best run and respected support units in the country. Their achievements and operation over the past season were exemplary. Probably most outstanding was the rescue of members of the Ballina Marine Rescue vessel and crew from 'Wanita' which capsized on the Ballina bar. Police have recommended that the Ballina crew be nominated for a Bravery Award.

There are many people who make up Far North Coast Surf Lifesaving – male and female, young and old and of many nationalities. These people are volunteers and whole-heartedly support an Australian organisation which is today a true icon.

The Directors of the branch have all represented the members in an efficient and professional manner. Greg Clarke (Director of Finance) has added professionalism to our accounting practices, Geoff Horsey (Director of Education) provides many years of experience, Elton Cummings (Public Officer) has given countless hours to Surf Life Saving and Debbie Pawsey (Director of Administration) exhibited a work ethic to be admired. The Club Presidents supported the branch totally and are to be commended, the many sponsors who make it all possible, the Juniors turned out in great numbers and fine spirit, our officials never turned down an opportunity to help, the many members and volunteers gave freely and seek no reward, the parents and families are supportive, loyal and understanding. Thank you to all.

We can look forward to the 2013-14 season with great expectations as one of the highlights will be the Branch taking official possession of the former Ballina Lighthouse & Lismore clubhouse. Already there is an enthusiastic committee working on the development and refurbishment of the building. This major progression will better enable the Far North Coast Branch to support its clubs, service the members and acknowledge our sponsors. Something to really look forward to next season.

The 2012-13 season was again a very busy one for all the clubs on the North Coast. Our members contributed 26,384 voluntary patrol hours on Clarence, Coffs Harbour, Bellingen and Nambucca Shire beaches.

During patrols our members performed 90 rescues, 2480 preventions and 83 first aid actions.

While the branch's patrolling numbers have remained static, the overall membership and junior membership is slightly down and this has been reflected in the number of awards which have been gained during the season.

Our patrolling members were very vigilant this season with a number of major rescues performed, which certainly saved lives in Coffs Harbour and Sawtell. Anika Morgan's rescue of four Korean workers at Woolgoolga in October 2012 earned her the NSW Rescue of the Month for October. The North Coast Support group also continued to have a high presence in the branch and was involved in one of the successful rescues at Sawtell.

Our new Director of Education, Sue Neil, was instrumental in improving the standards of education in the branch and ensuring that all clubs were compliant. Most of our clubs were represented at the SLSNSW's Club Conference which was held in Sydney in August and all agreed that it was a valuable experience.

Competitors from the branch continue to do well at all levels and carnivals held within the branch were well attended. Our senior competitor Ken Cook from Woolgoolga excelled in winning two titles in the 70+ age group at Rescue 2012 in Adelaide. The North Coast team performed admirably at the Interbranch Carnival at Blackhead in December.

The annual Junior Development Camp was conducted at Bonville in November and was an enjoyable experience for our Under 14 members. The Junior Development Program was carried out at all clubs educating the nippers in surf safety. Once again my thanks go to our major sponsor Newcastle Permanent Building Society. They provide us with the necessary funds to carry out most of our projects in the branch including our branch Awards of Excellence Evening, the Junior Development Camp and to send the branch team to the Interbranch Carnival. This year we also received an additional grant from the Newcastle Permanent Charitable Foundation to buy a Rescue Water Craft which will be kept in the Nambucca Region for emergencies. We can't thank this sponsor enough for its ongoing support for the North Coast Branch.

During the 2012-13 season the eight Mid North Coast clubs maintained a professional life saving service on the beaches from Camden Haven to Macksville Scotts Head, conducting 71 rescues, almost 6000 preventative measures and over 300 first aids. Some wild weather saw all resources tested but the training and expertise of our patrol members shone through. It must also be mentioned that clubs provided extended hours to address trends with the bathing public which strengthened our reputation of Vigilance and Service.

In this regard our Support Service Group consisting of a dedicated crew of RWC Operators and Duty Officers as kept busy attending to 31 callouts and routine surveillance patrols.

This service is escalating rapidly and many potential drownings have been averted. Thanks also to the clubs who have provided assistance with personnel and assets in remote locations and out of hours. I cannot stress enough the profile of this group within the Emergency Services sphere and the praise from other agencies such as Police and Local Government.

We are constantly reviewing our procedures and updating our equipment to ensure we provide the optimum response. My thanks to Paul Rayner, Director of Life Saving and Ryan Rosenbaum Support Services Coordinator, for their ongoing dedication.

Competition at both senior and junior events was well patronised and our Interbranch Team performed admirably. The North Coast Boat Series held regular Carnivals within the Branch. Our Clubs competed at Country, State and Australian Championships with some very pleasing results. Congratulations to all members of Surf Life Saving Lower North Coast for a successful 2012-13 season with no lives lost in our area of operations.

Our six clubs, from Crowdy Head SLSC in the north to Pacific Palms SLSC in the south, and our Support Operations team have once again shown the dedication needed by our members to maintain the high standards required.

Our members performed 40 rescues, 2443 preventative actions, 282 first aid treatments and 17,072 patrol hours. Total attendance on our beaches was estimated at 147,541.

Clubs should be commended on the professionalism they show in running the diverse business that Surf Life Saving has become, never forgetting that we rely on the support of our members to be able to run our clubs effectively.

Our clubs this season have been involved in running many events including ocean swims at Black Head (Head to Head swim), Cape Hawke -Forster (Club to Club swim) and Pacific Palms (Rock to Rock swim), the Forster Weekend of Surf, two rounds of the North Coast Boat Series at Forster, 1st and 2nd round of NSW IRB Premiership at Forster and Battle of the Boats at Pacific Palms SLSC.

Clubs have also helped in community events by providing water safety, first aid, general advice and expertise for events such as the Anaconda Adventure Race, Forster Adventure Race, Triathlon Multisport Festival and Championships, and many other smaller community events, which is testament to the fact that we are recognised in our communities as the experts in aquatic safety.

- Zero drowning deaths on our beaches for the third year running.
- The successful hosting of the Interbranch Championships by Blackhead SLSC.

- Two of our members are current SLSNSW Duty Officers Ben Atkinson and Richard Ellery.
- The Black Head SLSC Special Nippers Program was nominated at the SLSNSW Awards of Excellence.

- Two members were chosen to represent SLSNSW Country Team, Jordan Connolly and Jack Nicholson, in the New Zealand Tri Series carnivals.
- A very successful Junior Development Camp was held at Camp Elim, attended by more than 40 of our youth members who gained some great skills and formed some great friendships.

Our competition throughout the season was healthy with several carnivals held in our branch. Our members have attended all major carnivals including the World SLS Titles held in Adelaide as competitors, officials and water safety personnel. It gives me great pleasure to report on the 2012-13 season for the Hunter Branch 95th year. This reports on the achievements of our 7174 members.

As the President of Hunter Branch I am extremely proud of the 13 clubs, who have all achieved the Bronze Level in the Quality Club Program. In this comprehensive program, this is something very special.

The clubs have been quite entrepreneurial in their fundraising, grant applications and managing sponsorships, with most clubs assisting in raising \$30,000 through Ducks 4 Dollars. This support only comes with a professional image and again it is with pride I watch the clubs grow.

Lifesaving, our core business, was managed by Robert Houston and this season saw a big improvement in patrol performance. This past season lives were saved, preventative actions performed and first aids were administered. 67,694 patrol hours were volunteered throughout the branch keeping our beaches safe on Saturday, Sundays and Public Holidays. Our Support Operations Duty Officers have been called out on 39 occasions out of hours, the Rescue Water Craft assisted at carnivals, water safety for special events and out post patrolling all summer.

Education, managed by, Debbie Booth, also had a very busy season with the Sustainability Award Chart for clubs assisting to strengthen patrols. During the season Hunter Branch hosted a Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue - Search and Rescue Program, for SLSNSW. Six of our members participated and four joined with Police Emergency Rescue Services in May to learn skills in a Marine Rescue. Night Operations courses with IRB's have been conducted twice in the branch. Silver Beach Management Courses were conducted three times during the season.

In our Member Services Portfolio, managed by Steve Knight, Junior Members numbered 3148 and gained 3071 awards in Surf Safety. Age Managers qualifications increased and 52 U13 and U14 members attended the Youth Camp at Myuna Bay. The Rookie Program saw patrols strengthened with this two year Buddy Program really proving to retain youth in our ranks. Hunter members attended SLSNSW Youth Leadership Programs Youth Opportunity Makers Program, Lifesaving Exchange Program and of course our Junior Lifesavers of the Year attended a camp. On the financial front, managed by John Waghorn, the branch has continued partnerships with key sponsors.

Surf Sports managed by Grahame Lott and Steve Marley had a busy year with the Newcastle Permanent Surf Series, now in its fifth season. This series has a proven record of skills enhancement in our youth. Nine branch carnivals were conducted over the season.

Community Education is still booked out 12 months in advance, the 20 casual lifesaving staff we employ to present this Surf Fun Safe Course and Surf Survival Program is invaluable to the community and really does make our jobs easier in summer.

Highlights of the season are Caves Beach IRB Team setting a State record winning 10 championships, Stockton hosting the Australian Surf Rowers League Championships, which injected \$2m into the local economy, Newcastle SLSC hosting a Kelloggs Nutri-Grain round which beamed Newcastle around the world, Fingal hosting the State IRB Championships and Andrew Lange from Fingal SLSC winning Junior Male Lifesaver of the Year.

Seven of our clubs finished in the top 30 of the State Masters Championships. Swansea Belmont came 12th in the Open State Championships with Redhead 15th. At the State Age championships Swansea Belmont finished 3rd and Catherine Hill Bay 11th.

Representative Members were: 3 team members in the NSW Team, 6 members in the High Performance Team and 5 members in the Talented Athlete Program.

We had members officiate and referee at the State and Australian Championships proving the quality of our officials are among the best in Australia.

All in all this was a very rewarding season and it was certainly assisted by our dedicated staff Rhonda, Roz and Kathy.

A sincere thank you to SLSNSW Board of Directors, Managers and staff for the support and assistance so generously supplied to Hunter Branch.

The 2012-13 season has been an extremely successful year for Surf Life Saving Central Coast. We are proud to see our membership has grown significantly in the past 12 months from 8559 to 9112 members.

On behalf of the Central Coast Branch we would like to acknowledge the amazing contribution our 2373 active patrolling members, Rescue Water Craft Operators, SurfCom Operators and Duty Officers provided to the community last season.

Patrolling members completed 95,843 voluntary patrol hours and thanks to their vigilance and service, 544 lives were saved on our beaches with a further 25,259 bathers prevented from getting into difficulty.

Last season was one of the busiest on record and whilst we are proud to say that no lives were lost under the watch of our red and yellow army of volunteers, sadly seven people drowned along the Central Coast coastline at remote locations with a further 47 emergency tasking's received by the emergency services to people in need at either unpatrolled locations or outside of patrol hours.

Whilst SLSCC implemented many new programs to further enhance the quality of our lifesaving services last season, these figures are concerning and we will be developing further strategies to continue to meet the always increasing demands of the public along our coastline and endeavour to reduce these trends into the future.

The Branch's focus continues to be on supporting our clubs. This is evident by the commencement of the Quality Clubs Program. Our goal is to have all 15 clubs enrolled in this program within the next two years.

For the first time, SLSCC was also in a financial position to provide direct financial assistance to the clubs. This financial contribution will assist clubs in managing their operations and lifesaving services.

The Branch was recognised for its innovative culture by winning "Initiative of the Year" at the Surf Life Saving NSW Awards of Excellence for the U15-17 Development tour to Far North Queensland. In addition to this program, the Member Services portfolio continued to work hard at developing our youth through the successful delivery of our ongoing Junior Activities Program, Rookie Lifesaver Program, Duke of Edinburgh Program and Indigenous Program.

Another key outcome for SLSCC was the development of a new three year Strategic Plan which will come into effect for the 2013-14 season.

Our Education programs play a very important role in up skilling our members and strengthening our core business of lifesaving. Our members gained 13,001 awards during the season and were once again 100% compliant in the ASQA audit for the fifth consecutive year in a row.

The Ausgrid Community Education Program continued as one of the fundamental services SLSCC provide to the Central Coast community. In 2012-13 over 5000 school children participated in the program.

SLSCC continued our proud tradition as one of the leading branches in Surf Sports. Our athletes once again claimed numerous medals at State, Aussie and World Championships. The introduction of fluoro pink competition safety vests which were worn by all competitors in water competition throughout the season was also important.

We appreciate the ongoing support from all levels of government. Both Gosford City Council and Wyong Shire Council continued their support for clubs and the association with annual operating grants. Gosford City Water Safety Rate Levy also continued to provide valuable support to surf club facilities and provide essential rescue equipment to the clubs.

It is important that we also recognise our four State and Federal Members for their support over the past season.

To our loyal sponsors, your support is very much appreciated and is the key to our success. We see our relationships as partnerships as we strive to work hard in assisting you to ensure all targets on both sides of the sponsorships are met. The achievements we have attained this season could not be possible without your ongoing commitment and for this Surf Life Saving is extremely appreciative.

Thanks must also be passed onto the Directors and staff of our governing bodies SLSNSW and SLSA for your continued support. Thank you to the Directors, their partners and staff of SLSCC for your commitment and 'can do' attitude. The success of the Branch over the past 12 months is a direct result of your dedication and leadership.

In closing, SLSCC is extremely proud of the performances of the 15 clubs and 9112 members and would like to pass on our appreciation for your efforts throughout the 2012-13 season. The 2013-14 season marks the 75th Anniversary of Surf Life Saving Central Coast, so we look forward to another strong season on the beach and huge year of celebrations in recognition of this occasion.

Sadly though, there were several tragic drownings in our region which occurred outside of hours or areas of operation. Our Duty Officers and patrolling members became involved in search and rescue missions in these cases and assisted NSW Police and other emergency services. Our thoughts go out to families of those who lost their lives.

Our Branch Executive's first goal this time last year was to achieve constant feedback from the Board of Management and identify the wants and needs of the clubs, patrols, officials and competitors and to use this feedback to set new directions to meet our joint goals as a branch. We have also engaged our youth, officials and life members in the process.

One of our directions set for the 2012-13 season was to set up a Strategic Review Committee to examine the services we provide as a branch to our clubs. We achieved this. The Strategic Review Committee is also reviewing our constitution so that we are aligned with the fiduciary obligations and responsibilities demanded by our clubs. In an increasingly changing landscape in which we operate, it is important that our Constitution is amended to reflect these changes and meet our future needs.

Our major radio upgrade at SurfCom and securing an offer of a 21 year lease on our building was achieved after 40 years of trying. Securing a lease on the Warringah Surf Rescue building at Fisherman's Beach was a key goal. The assistance, guidance and support we received from three State Members of Parliament – Mike Baird, Brad Hazzard and Rob Stokes has been exemplary.

Our thanks also to SLSNSW, who assisted with the planning, design and part-funding of the radio room upgrade. We now have new radio equipment and computers and are linked to the statewide radio network enabling us to assist other branches when required. This season, we successfully handled the radio communications for the 17 Illawarra clubs as well our own branch. Another significant achievement for the branch was bringing the Club Junior Activities under our Board of Youth and Membership Development portfolio. This was supported by the 21 club presidents in order to give more focus as a branch to our juniors for future development. At last count our Junior Activity membership (5-13yrs) was 7655 or 39 per cent of our total membership, so it is vital that this group has a strong voice in the future of our branch.

After 42 years of radio communications support to South Coast Branch as a Branch Radio Room with four of those years as a State Regional SurfCom the Kiama radio Communications Centre has closed. Warren Rennie AM of North Cronulla SLSC is a true stalwart of Surf Life Saving, contributing and achieving in a voluntary capacity for an incredible 56 years.

Warren has served the club in many capacities including administration, lifesaving, education and competition. His commitment extends through to a national level and in 1979 Warren was elected as the Honorary Chief Superintendent of SLSA.

Warren's involvement in education, lifesaving and competition is hugely significant having successfully coached five Sydney Branch teams, three NSW teams and the 1971 Australian Representative Team against South Africa.

He was part of the instructional team which first introduced the new Bronze Medallion syllabus in the late 1960s and was NSW Team Coach, presiding over many Interstate Championship wins during the 1970s. Warren was Referee of the Australian Life Saving Championships for more than 12 years and refereed six World Life Saving Championships. He was one of the first members to be inducted into the SLSA Hall of Fame.

BURF RESCUE

DIRECTOR OF FINANCE REPORT

It is my pleasure to present the audited Balance Sheet and Financial Statement of Surf Life Saving New South Wales ("SLSNSW"), and its controlled entity (Surf Lifesaving Services P/L) for the 12 months ending 30 June 2013.

Operational and Financial Review

For the year ended 30 June 2103 SLSNSW reported a surplus of \$1.47m (2012 \$2.71m) a 46% decline on prior year. However, once allowance is made for a \$1.4m Federal Government capital contribution to the State Headquarters received in the prior year there is actually a 12% improvement. Revenue for the period increased 18% to \$22.83m on the back of improved fundraising, grant funding and commercial revenue.

Government Funding

Support from government increased by 33% from \$6.27m in 2012 to \$8.99m in 2013, representing 39% of total revenue (2012 35%).

During the year the following major operational and capital funding was received:

- State Government Capital Facilities Funding \$2m to assist with much needed building maintenance and construction of surf clubs in NSW
- StateGovernmentOperationalFunding\$1.7mtoassistthe ongoing operations of SLSNSW
- State Government Rescue Helicopter Funding \$1.5m to ensure 24/7 operations of the Rescue Helicopter (Southern Region)
- StateEnhanceRescueCapabilitiesGrant\$1.0mtospecifically cover – Emergency Response/Communications, lifesaving equipment and resources plus education
- State Water Safety Black Spot Grant \$0.3m to survey and identify water safety black spots up and down the coast
- StateADHCCommunityAccessGrant\$1.5mtoimplement disability inclusion programs over the next three years.

Fundraising Revenue

Fundraising revenue increased by 18% to \$2.34m (2012 \$1.98m) driven by the SLSNSW raffle and direct marketing program. This program is conducted on our behalf by external fundraising organisations. All fundraising is conducted in accordance with the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991. The majority of the net raffle revenue (75%), together with 75% of "Guardian of Surf" donations received from the Surf Life Saving Foundation, is distributed to NSW clubs/branches through the annual fundraising distribution. SLSNSW retains 25% to assist with nonfunded member programs.

It is pleasing to note that our fundraising distributions to clubs/ branches in NSW increased for the second successive year to \$5,858 each (distributed during 2012-13) and will increase further based upon this year's fundraising to \$6,311 (to be distributed in 2013-14 to compliant clubs/branches). This is a great result!

Sponsorship & Donation

Sponsorship & Donation revenue remained constant over the period at \$2.58m (2012 \$2.63m). Sponsorship in a difficult climate declined 8% whilst donations increased 10%.

Revenue from Services Provided

Income derived from provision of Services both not for profit (NFP) and commercial increased 13 % from \$7.49m to \$8.43m.

- Commercial (Lifeguard, Training & First Aid) Operations 14%
- Non-Commercial Member Services 13%

Expenditure

Expenditure for the period increased 28% to \$21.36m from \$16.65m. The largest single component of this increase relates to Grants (both made and deferred) which increased \$3.2m, or 51% of the overall increase. Grants deferred constitutes \$1.31m of this total increase.

The remainder of the percentage increase was made up of:

- Core Activities 5%
- Management & Administration 25%
- Fundraising 2%

It should be noted the organisation's management and administrative costs have remained below the target of less than 25% of total revenue or total expenditure being 19% and 20% respectively.

Grants

Actual payments (as distinct from provision/deferred) to clubs, branches and the Rescue Helicopter increased 49% to \$5.69 (2012: \$3.81m) consisting:

- Clubs \$3.4m (70% from grants & 30% from fundraising/ donations)
- Helicopter \$1.5m (100% funded from grants)
- Branches \$0.8m (72% funded from sponsorship/grants & 28% funded from fundraising/donations)

Distributions make up 27% of total expenditure and equate to 25% of total revenue. Distributions assist with capital works, lifesaving equipment, volunteer uniforms and general operating costs.

Core Activities

Expenditure on Core Activities increased by 5% (\$250k) though the mix between the component activities changed significantly:

- Lifesaving and lifeguards 24%
- Education and training 18%
- Member services -48%

Lifesaving increased due to specific projects aimed at improving lifesaving infrastructure and knowledge. The increase was supported by additional grant funding. One of these projects was the Coastsafe (coastal auditing) program which aims to identify and catalogue all the black spots and emergency support infrastructure along the NSW coast being a standout.

For education and learning most of the growth has been in commercial training space with additional trainers to support the increase in the business. Member services declined as it did not include expenditure associated with the club conference.

Cash

The organisation currently holds \$14.1 m in the form of cash or term deposits in accordance with the SLSNSW Investment policy. The majority of these deposits are held in effective trust to cover deferred grants, fundraising commitments or to cover the long term sustainability of SLSNSW, with the remainder to cover operational requirements until current year funding is received.

Further I would like to congratulate the team on achieving a Top 10 result in the PwC Transparency Awards for the third successive year in 2011-12.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2013

1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements cover Surf Life Saving New South Wales and Controlled Entity (Surf Life Saving Services Pty Limited) as an individual entity. Surf Life Saving New South Wales is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

Basis of Preparation

The company has elected to early adopt the Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards and AASB 2010–2: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements. Accordingly, the entity has also early adopted AASB 2011–2: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from the Trans-Tasman Convergence Project – Reduced Disclosure Requirements and AASB 2012–7: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements in respect of AASB 2010–6: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Disclosures on Transfers of Financial Assets and AASB 2011–9: Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Disclosures of Other Comprehensive Income.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the Corporations Act 2001. The company is a not for profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

The financial statements were authorised for issue 16 September, 2013, by the directors of the company.

Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets and liabilities of all subsidiaries of the company as at 30 June 2013 and the results of all subsidiaries for the year then ended. The company and its subsidiaries together are referred to in this financial report as the group or the consolidated entity.

Subsidiaries are all entities (including special purpose entities) over which the group has the power to govern the financial and operating policies, generally accompanying a shareholding of more than one half of the voting rights. The existence and effect of potential voting rights that are currently exercisable or convertible are considered when assessing whether the group controls another entity.

Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the group. They are de-consolidated from the date that control ceases.

Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between group companies are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of the impairment of the asset transferred. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the group.

Significant Accounts Judgements

Grants Revenue

The company has received a number of government grants during the year. Once the company has been notified of the terms and conditions of each grant they are reviewed to determine whether the funds relate to a reciprocal grant (i.e. payment for services rendered) in which case it is accounted for under AASB 118 Revenue or non-reciprocal grant in which case it is accounted for under AASB 1004 Contributions.

Significant Accounting Estimates and Assumptions

The key estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of certain assets or liabilities within the next annual reporting period are:

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of manufactured products includes direct materials, direct labour and an appropriate portion of variable and fixed overheads. Overheads are applied on the basis of normal operating capacity. Costs are assigned on the basis of weighted average costs.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Property

Freehold land and buildings are shown at their fair value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic, but at least triennial, valuations by external independent valuers, less accumulated depreciation for buildings.

In the periods when the freehold land and buildings are not subject to an independent valuation, the directors conduct directors' valuations to ensure the land and building's carrying amount is not materially different to the fair value.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of land and buildings are credited to a revaluation reserve in equity.

Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are recognised against fair value reserves directly in equity; all other decreases are recognised in surplus or loss.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Motor Vehicles, Plant and equipment

Motor vehicles, plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

In the event the carrying amount of motor vehicles, plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

The cost of fixed assets constructed within the company includes the cost of materials, direct labour, borrowing costs and an appropriate proportion of fixed and variable overheads.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of motor vehicles, property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the company. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate

Office, Plant & Equipment	20%-33%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

The Directors have resolved that the motor vehicle depreciation rate increase to 33% effective from 1 July, 2013.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are

recognised in surplus or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Financial Instruments

Initial Recognition and Measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the company commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (i.e. trade date accounting adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transactions costs except where the instrument is classified 'at fair value through surplus or loss', in which case transaction costs are expensed to surplus or loss immediately.

(i) Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the company's intention to hold these investments to maturity. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

(ii) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the company assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. The assessment will include considering external and internal sources of information, including dividends received from subsidiaries, associates or jointly controlled entities deemed to be out of preacquisition surplus. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in surplus or loss unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount in accordance with another Standard (e.g. in accordance with the revaluation model in AASB 116). Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease in accordance with that Standard.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Impairment testing is performed annually for goodwill and intangible assets with indefinite lives.

Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may not satisfy vesting requirements. Those cash outflows are discounted using market yields on national government bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the company has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of consideration received and receivable. Revenue is recognised net of the amounts of goods and service tax (GST) payable to the Australian Taxation Office.

Revenue from Fundraising

Donations & Raffle Revenue

Donations collected are recognised as revenue when the company gains control, economic benefits are probable and the amount of the donation/raffle can be measured reliably.

Legacies are recognised when the company is notified of an impending distribution or the legacy is received, whichever occurs earlier. Revenue from legacies comprising bequests of shares or other property are recognised at fair value, being the market value of the shares or property at the date the company becomes legally entitled to the share or property.

Grant Funding

SLSNSW activities are supported by grants received from the State and Federal Government as well as other private organisations. Grants received on the condition that specified services are delivered, or conditions are fulfilled, are considered reciprocal. Such grants are initially recognised as liability and revenue recognised as services are performed or conditions fulfilled. Revenue from non-reciprocal grants is recognised when SLSNSW obtains control over the funds.

Sales of Goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point of delivery as this corresponds to the transfer of significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods and cessation of all involvement in those goods.

Investment Income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Services Income

Revenue recognition relating to the provision of services is determined with reference to the stage of completion of the transaction at the end of the reporting period and where outcome of the contract can be estimated reliably. Stage of completion is determined with reference to the services performed to date as a percentage of total anticipated services to be performed. Where the outcome cannot be estimated reliably, revenue is recognised only to the extent that related expenditure is recoverable.

Asset Sales

The gain or loss on disposal of all non-current assets is determined as the difference between the carrying amount at the time of disposal and the net proceeds on disposal.

Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to a particular category they have been allocated to activities on a basis with the use of the resources.

Fundraising costs are those costs directly incurred in seeking voluntary contributions by donation and do not include costs communicating information relating to the activities carried on by SLSNSW.

Core service costs those cost directly incurred in the core service areas (Lifesaving & Lifeguards, Member services, Training & Education and Surf Sports).

Grants & Distribution costs are those distributions made to clubs, branches and affiliates to assist with gear, capital works and general running expenses.

Management and administration costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company that remain unpaid.

Trade payables are recognised at their transaction price. Trade payables are obligations on the basis of normal credit terms.

Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

New Accounting Standards for Application in Future Periods

The AASB has issued a number of new and amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have mandatory application dates for future reporting periods, some of which are relevant to the company. The company has decided to adopt the new standards when they become mandatory with the exception of the reduced disclosure framework.
